1. Newsletter went to printers today and should be in the mail to all residents by the end of the week.
2. There is a late Intermunicipal Agreement resolution for approval tonight with the Town of Victor to assist the town with Code Enforcement and Fire Inspections.
3. Mortgage tax receipts were up from the same time as last year at \$273,060.63.
4. Ontario County Sheriff's Office is investigating the damage to bathroom doors at the Mertensia Park Lodge and the use of E-bikes on private roads and trails.
5. Two Ontario County committee meetings: Government Operations & Insurance and Ways & Means.

Highway & Parks Superintendent Tim Ford reported:

1. Getting letters of intent ready to order new trucks. Received letter from International, rising costs due to tariffs, which will affect the cost of their trucks next year. Tim stated that the new sweeper truck will cost about \$7,000 more because of tariffs.

Town Clerk Michelle Finley reported:

1. Attended County Tax Collectors meeting last Wednesday, County contracted with a new vendor to print, stuff, and mail tax bills. Towns have the option to mail their own as in past years, most towns are going to have the new vendor mail them out.

Water & Sewer Superintendent Aaron Bissell reported:

1. Preparing to order new equipment for the 2026 budget year.
2. NY Fence was onsite; they have submitted their markup requests and they do intend to get over and do the installation of the fence and security gate repair.
3. Staff continue to work on dismantling the old and out of service RBCs. They are going to repurpose the space.
4. Brickyard Tank – confirmed with the Department of Health today that they can put the tank in service on December 2nd. Final commissioning of the altitude control valve in the tank will take place pm December 1st.

RESOLUTION #378-2025:

Councilman Casale offered the following Resolution, seconded by **Councilman Bowerman**:

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF CONGRESSMAN NICK LANGWORTHY'S ENERGY CHOICE ACT (H.R. 3699, S. 1945) AND IN OPPOSITION TO GOVERNMENT-MANDATED NATURAL GAS BANS

WHEREAS, affordable and reliable energy is essential to the health, safety, and economic prosperity of New York families, businesses, and communities; and

WHEREAS, natural gas remains a dependable, cost-effective, and clean-burning energy source used by millions of New Yorkers to heat their homes, cook their food, and power their businesses; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, New York State enacted the **Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA)**, which mandates aggressive emissions reductions and serves as the foundation for sweeping energy restrictions, including efforts to phase out natural gas; and

WHEREAS, building on the CLCPA, Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature in 2023 enacted provisions in the state budget banning natural gas and other fossil fuel hookups in most new residential and commercial buildings, effective 2026 for smaller buildings, and 2029 for larger buildings, thereby eliminating consumer choice and limiting access to affordable energy; and

WHEREAS, the outcome to the current court challenge to the NYS CLCPA is unknown; and

WHEREAS, Governor Hochul has publicly supported these bans and related measures as part of her administration’s climate and energy agenda, despite widespread concerns that such mandates will increase costs, strain grid reliability, and restrict energy diversity; and

WHEREAS, these top-down policies undermine affordability, threaten reliability during peak demand, and strip away the freedom of consumers and businesses to choose the energy sources that best meet their needs; and

WHEREAS, the Energy Choice Act would safeguard households, small businesses, hospitals, farmers, and manufacturers from harmful government overreach and preserve access to an “all-of-the-above” energy strategy that strengthens reliability and affordability; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Farmington strongly supports the Energy Choice Act as introduced by Congressman Langworthy (H.R. 3699) and Senator Justice (S. 1945) and stands firmly opposed to New York State’s natural gas bans, the CLCPA-driven restrictions, and other state energy mandates that eliminate consumer choice; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town of Farmington urges Congress to pass the Energy Choice Act to defend consumer choice, protect energy affordability, and preserve reliable access to natural gas for New Yorkers; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to Congressman Nick Langworthy, Senator Jim Justice, Congresswoman Claudia Tenney, Senators Chuck Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, Governor Kathy Hochul, and leadership of the New York State Legislature.

WHEREAS, MRB will combine this design with the previous Phase 1 design (NYS 332 to north of Yerkes Road) into a single set of project documents for agency approvals and permitting, and

WHEREAS, the proposal identifies a total engineering design compensation of \$55,500 and a total additional services of \$39,000, and

WHEREAS, \$90,000 was budgeted in 2025 to be moved into the capital project and added to the remaining funds from Phase 1 design, now therefore
